# TSA Tips for Military Travel

Ed. note: <u>The TSA Blog</u> from the Transportation Security Administration offers tips, topics and comments to facilitate an ongoing dialogue with the traveling public about security and screening. One blog in particular—"Tips for Military Travelers"—provides helpful advice for those deploying, those returning and their families. Following is the text of the May 7, 2013 blog.

Here are a few helpful hints to help members of the armed forces achieve a trouble-free travel experience at the airport.

#### Packing tips

- If you wish to lock your checked baggage, use a TSA-recognized lock, otherwise the lock could be cut.
- If your unit is traveling with weapons, please go here for more information.
- If it looks like a bomb, grenade, land mine, or other incendiary, don't pack it. Even if it's not the real deal, it will slow the screening process.

Military Family Member Gate Passes. Family members who want to accompany a deploying service member to the boarding gate or greet them returning from deployment at the arrival gate may receive passes to enter the secure area of the airport. Interested military family members should contact their air carrier representative at the departure/arrival airport for proper local procedures. Remember, the family members will have to be screened through the TSA checkpoint just as if they were flying.

Assistance for America's Veterans: Disabled, Injured and Wounded Warriors. TSA wants to facilitate the

screening of injured and wounded service members and veterans including individuals associated with a <u>Wounded Warrior</u> program. Once flight arrangements are made with the airline, the injured service member or veteran, family member, or other representatives can contact the TSA Cares helpline with details of the itinerary.

**Aug. 8, 1990 -** Operation Desert Shield. The first USAF transport, a C-141, arrived in Dhahran. The aircraft had a reserve aircrew.

Aug. 9, 1962 - The USAF first demonstrated a multiple countdown capability when a 389 SMW crew from Francis E. Warren AFB successfully launched two Atlas D missiles at Cape Canaveral on 5,000-mile flights.

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McDonnell-Douglas C-9A Nightingale. It was the first military aeromedical evacuation aircraft to be jet powered.

**Aug. 11, 1950 -** Korean War. C-119 Flying Boxcars began airlifting trucks from Tachikawa AB to Taegu.

**Aug. 12, 1972** – Lt. Col. Wendell Shawler became the first USAF pilot to fly the F-15.

Aug. 13, 1952 - The USAF ordered the Boeing B-52 Stratofortress, an

eight jet heavy bomber, into fullscale production.

August 14, 1945 – Final B-29 Combat Mission Against Japan. This Twentieth Air Force mission included a record number of effective aircraft: 754 B-29s and 169 fighters. One phase of the mission, against Tsuchizaka, produced the longest unstaged mission (3,650 miles) of the war from the Marianas.
