Sexual Assault Awareness and Prevention Is a Core Value

Shining a bright light on a problem is the first step in defining its solution, and sexual assault awareness and prevention is in the spotlight this month at all levels.

Nationally, in a Proclamation issued by the White House last week proclaiming April as National Sexual Assault Awareness and Prevention month, the president noted that in the last two decades the nation has made "meaningful progress toward addressing sexual assault."

But the Commander-in-Chief didn't stop there. He called special attention to the military where incidents of sexual assault often go unreported: "Just as we keep fighting sexual assault in our neighborhoods, we must also recommit to ending it in our military -- because no one serving our country should be at risk of assault by a fellow service member. Where this crime does take place, it cannot be tolerated; victims must have access to support, and offenders must face the consequences of their actions. Earlier this week, Secretary of Defense Chuck Hagel re-emphasized the message that stopping sexual assault and supporting victims is everyone's responsibility with this message: "We own it ... we'll solve it ... together.

"Together we must work every day to instill a climate that does not tolerate or ignore sexist behavior,

sexual harassment, or sexual assault," he continued. "These have no place in the United States military and violate everything we stand for and the values we defend. Creating a culture free of the scourge of sexual assault requires establishing an environment where dignity and respect is afforded to all, and where diversity is celebrated as one of our greatest assets as a force."

Bringing the focus even closer, on the Air Force web page reinforcing the Air Force's commitment to eliminate incidence of sexual assault and support victims, Sexual Assault and Response Program, Gen. Mark A. Welsh III, Air Force Chief of Staff, emphasizes "Sexual assault has no place in our Air Force. We live in a culture of respect. We cherish our core values of integrity, service, and excellence. But in order to ensure all Airmen experience and benefit from those values, we must eliminate sexual assault in our ranks."

At the personal level, it's obvious that eliminating sexual assault is not defined by a month, nor is it purged by a Presidential Proclamation or a web page, no matter how important each of those elements is. At the personal level sexual assault as a primal non-starter can be found in the words of every Airman on his or her first day in the service, the words of the Airman's Creed declaring "... I am faithful to a proud heritage, a tradition of honor, and a legacy of valor."

► THIS WEEK IN AIR FORCE HISTORY

April 4, 1944 - Fifteenth Air Force conducted the first American bombing raid on Bucharest, Romania.

April 5, 1958 - An Atlas ICBM flew from Cape Canaveral Air Force Station, Fla., to an impact area some 600 miles away.

April 6, 1980 - The first air refueled C-141B mission flew from Beale AFB, Calif., to RAF Mildenhall, England.

An aircrew assigned to the 443rd MAW made the flight in 11 hours 12 minutes with one refueling.

April 7, 1999 - The Air Force and DARPA selected Boeing to build two unmanned combat air vehicles for testing at the Dryden Flight Research Center at Edwards AFB.

April 8, 1918 - The 1st Aero Squadron, I Corps, was the first American squadron assigned to the front in World War I.

April 9, 1997 - Lockheed-Martin and Boeing rolled out the F-22 at its Marietta plant.

April 10, 1974 - C-130 Hercules aircraft, crews, and communicators supported Operation Nimbus Star to sweep the Suez Canal free of mines and other obstacles to navigation.
