The Month of the Military Child Highlights Benefits That Last All Year

n an April 8 post on the White House blog, Dr. Jill Biden, wife of the vice president, noted that April, the Month of the Military Child, "gives us the opportunity to celebrate our nation's youngest heroes—the children whose parents serve in our Armed Forces."

Ever an educator, Dr. Biden noted that there is a much-needed raised awareness and understanding about how to help the military child in the classroom. Through the combined forces of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education (AACTE) and the Military Child Education Coalition (MCEC), more than 100 colleges have committed to educating the educators to be more responsive to the social, emotional and academic needs of children in military families.

Military children are often "passively volunteered" to serve their country: They move and change schools three times as often as their civilian-family classmates. Parental deployments pose another set of challenges as the children face birthdays and holidays without one parent or both, and often become preoccupied with that parent's safe return. Family transitions, reintegration, and the eventual return of the deployed parent—who may or may not be profoundly different—have unique impacts. Often the youngsters find they must face a situation with wisdom and caring far beyond their years.

"Selfless" doesn't begin to describe them. They are resilient. They are self-sacrificing. They are remarkable.

Today there are nearly two million Americans under the age of 18 who have parent serving in the military. Approximately 900,000 Americans have experienced the deployment of one or both parents multiple times. Put another way, if there was a "City of the Military Child," the population would equal that of Houston's.

While the world focuses on The Military Child in April, the Air Force offers resources year-round. At the Military One Spot website there is page for Children, Youth & Teens providing age-appropriate information on topics ranging from child care to changing schools to summer camp. This month, there is a separate page that focuses on the Military Child. Again, the topics vary, from caring for an exceptional child to moving to help with parenting situations unique to military families. A link to a directory of installations lists Family Center Offices and a wealth of information on all things related to Family Members.

At a granular level, <u>Adventures of a Military Child</u> is a blog that personifies the military child and allows a glimpse into their life in a way that no one else could.

This month's special focus on "The Military Child" underscores for the rest of the world what military parents, teachers and youth leaders understand intrinsically: In so many ways, these youngsters are the future of America, and it never looked better.

► THIS WEEK IN AIR FORCE HISTORY

April 11, 1918 - The 1st Aero Squadron, I Corps Observation Group, equipped with bi-place Spads, made the first U.S. observation patrol over enemy lines in World War I.

April 12 1966 – Strategic Air Command B-52s hit targets in North Vietnam for the first time, when they attacked a supply route in the Mu Gia Pass, 85 miles north of the border.

April 14, 1970 - The Minuteman III deployment in North Dakota began when Minot AFB accepted its first missile. It arrived on board a C-141 in a flight from Hill AFB, Utah, in the first airlift of an operational Minuteman III.

April 15, 1972 - The last F-100 Super Sabre left USAFE.

April 16, 1969 - The first Minuteman II operational test launch was unsuccessful.

April 17, 1989 - Lockheed delivered the 50th and last C-5B Galaxy transport to the Air Force.
