Blue Acts of Green Protect the Earth for More Than Just Earth Day

emonstrating support for environmental protection is the foundation for Earth Day, observed on April 22nd each year. Designated as International Mother Earth Day by a consensus resolution of the United Nations in 2009, Earth Day has morphed in both date and process, but never in its focus.

Pioneered at a UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) in 1969, and augmented by a separate environmental teach-in on April 22, 1970, the day has come to focus awareness of Earth's vulnerabilities through the lens of over 22,000 organizations in 169 countries in 2013.

The Air Force's observance of Earth Day 2013 will build on the service's commitment to "Conserve Today. Secure Tomorrow" by focusing this year's campaign on water resource management, including water conservation, use of water saving technologies in design and construction, storm and wastewater management, water quality and pollution prevention.

For the Air Force, focusing on energy conservation also saves water—millions of gallons a year. More importantly, they save money, as in these projects:

• At Hurlburt Field, Fla., eight miles of new reuse pipes distribute more than half a million gallons of treated wastewater a day for construction and irrigation. The

old capacity was only two percent of that at 10,000 gallons.

- Cannon AFB has increased its effluent capacity by adding two holding ponds next to the wastewater treatment plant. Xeriscaping, the use of rocks and mulch with drought-tolerant plants, is also part of Cannon's conservation program, replacing the need for grass, water and maintenance.
- On Holloman AFB, construction of a water reclamation facility uses pretreated wastewater to create secondary irrigation for the golf course, realizing a yearly savings of 70 million gallons of water.

At the individual level, simple habit changes to the daily routine contribute to immense water savings over time: Shorten your shower by one minute. Turn off the water as you're brushing your teeth. Repair leaky faucets and toilets. Water the lawn only in the morning or evening to prevent evaporation. Capture and reuse rainwater. Wash only full loads in the dishwasher and in the laundry.

Although the Air Force is emphasizing water conservation during this year's focus on Earth Day, conservation resources and tips relating to a variety of recycling, pollution prevention and energy initiatives can be found on the Air Force's <u>Blue Acts of Green</u> webpage.

► THIS WEEK IN AIR FORCE HISTORY

April 18, 1942 - From the carrier USS Hornet, located 668 miles off Tokyo, Lt. Col. James H. Doolittle led 16 B-25s in the first raid on Japan. The range of the mission caused the raiders to crash land in China. The attack caused little damage; however, the mission raised U.S. morale and reversed a trend of Japanese victories. Doolittle later received the Medal of Honor for leading the mission.
