Child Abuse Prevention: Bases Put Personal Touch to Sensitive Issues

s we begin to wrap up child abuse prevention month in the Air Force it's easy to get caught up in numbers and statistics that show how pervasive physical and emotional abuse of our children has become. But this past month, there were many Air Force bases around the globe that put their own spin on child abuse awareness and have made the month much more than simply a month to become "aware."

At MacDill Air Force Base in Tampa, Fla., the base Family Advocacy Program has launched a New Parent Program that hosted a lunch brown bag series that discussed issues ranging from toddler toilet training to how to deal with tantrums and single parenting (moms wearing combat boots). A similar program at Fairchild AFB in Spokane, Wash., promotes year-around efforts that teaches young parents everything from baby feeding to providing water babies classes and even extends the month to include a basics course for dads during the month of May. Their sentiments are that "it takes a village to raise a child" and shows through various programs that it's much more than just a quotable quote.

At Seymour Johnson AFB in Goldsboro, N.C., the base has partnered with the city of Goldsboro to, not only get involved with the city's official proclamation, but put teeth into child abuse prevention and education. One such class, "a child lures," stresses street safety and provides 16 strategies abductors use to lure children away from their caregivers.

Ellsworth AFB, S.D., puts more of an Air Force specific spin to their program and looks at the common factors facing families overwhelmed by military-specific issues such as lengthy deployments, financial issues and others that contribute to life stresses. Their New Parent Support Program allows teams to visit families about to have a child or who have a child under the age of 3 and educate them on child development and military-related stressors.

At Tyndall AFB in the Florida panhandle, the base has partnered with the Panama City Beach Fire Rescue to provide <u>car seat safety checks</u>. Automobile accidents are the number one killer of children between the ages of one to 12.

At most bases throughout the Air Force, family advocacy programs highlight the month with educational tips on how to deal with such issues as neglect, physical and emotional abuse and shaken baby syndrome and the symptoms behind them. Many other family advocacy managers posted first person accounts as counselors or in some cases as victims of child abuse, providing tips or shattering myths. Whatever the method, bases throughout the Air Force have made the month much more than simply a theme to check off their list.

► THIS WEEK IN AIR FORCE HISTORY

April 25, 1944 - Flying a Sikorsky YR-4 helicopter, Lt Carter Harman, 1st Air Commando Group, rescued four men from the jungle in Burma, the first combat rescue by helicopter in the US AAF.

April 26, 1952 - In air-to-air operations, Maj. William H. Wescott, 51st Fighter-Interceptor Group, destroyed his fifth MiG in four weeks, becoming the Korean War's twelfth ace.
