

Post Traumatic Stress Disorder

Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) is a mental health problem that can occur after someone has gone through a traumatic event or events, such as war-related combat stress, sexual or physical assault, or a natural or manmade disaster. Because of the way this disorder can affect not only the person who suffers from it, but those who are around them, it is incredibly important that we educate and promote awareness about this condition.

- 1.9% of active duty Airmen have been diagnosed with PTSD at least once in their military career.
- Each installation has a Behavioral Health Optimization Program (BHOP) with credentialed mental health providers in primary care to improve management of behavioral health conditions.
- As of 13 Nov 2015, all mental health patients are required to be screened for depression and PTSD, in accordance with AFI 44-172, *Mental Health*.

► THIS WEEK IN AIR FORCE HISTORY

June 23-24, 1952 – Combined air attacks by the Air Force, Navy and Marines nearly destroyed the electric power potential of North Korea.

June 24, 1963 – The Strategic Air Command, with the 66th Missile Squadron, accepted the first flight of 10 Minuteman I (Model B) intercontinental ballistic missiles at Ellsworth Air Force Base, South Dakota.

June 25, 1996 – Terrorists bombed Khobar Towers near King Abdul-Aziz Air Base, Saudi Arabia, killing 19 Air Force personnel and injuring 300 others. It was the worst terrorist attack against American military personnel since the 1983 bombing of a U.S. Marine barracks in Lebanon. Air Force personnel were in Saudi Arabia to support Operation Southern Watch.

June 26, 1942 – The F6F Hellcat, the preferred carrier-borne fighter, first flew, and it subsequently saw action against the Japanese in September 1943.

June 27, 1976 – Airmen at Vandenberg Air Force Base, California, launched the first Titan II intercontinental ballistic missile with a Universal Space Guidance System.

June 28, 1917 – Langley Field, named for aviation pioneer Samuel Pierpont Langley, and located adjacent to Hampton and Newport News, Virginia, was authorized as an experimental air station.

June 29, 1950 – President Harry Truman authorized Gen. Douglas MacArthur to dispatch air forces against targets in North Korea.
