- July 19th marks the 75th anniversary of the start of the first aviation class comprised of 13 cadets.
- The Tuskegee Airmen flew more than 1,200 missions for the 99th, 100th, 301st and 302nd Fighter Squadrons under the Twelfth Air Force.
- The most famous African-American unit of World War II was the 332nd Fighter Group manned by the Tuskegee Airmen.
- The 99th Fighter Squadron had a total of 112 aerial victories during World War II.

► THIS WEEK IN AIR FORCE HISTORY

June 30, 1982 – Rockwell International rolled out the Space Shuttle Challenger.

July 1, 1996 – An Air Force crew flew an EA-6B Prowler off the deck of the USS Constellation for the first time.

July 2, 1943 – Lt. Charles Hall, 99th Fighter Squadron, became the first American black pilot to shoot down an Axis plane, a German Focke-Wulf 190, over Sicily.

July 3, 1949 – The Air Force gave the B-29 Enola Gay, the plane that dropped the atomic bomb on Hiroshima, Japan, to the Smithsonian Institution.

July 4, 1908 – Scientific American offered the first American air trophy for the first flight of one kilometer. Glenn H. Curtiss won this award at Hammondsport, New York, in the June Bug with a one minute, 42.5 second flight at 39 mph. A representative of the Fédération Aéronautique Internationale timed and measured the event. It was the first official test of an airplane made in America.

July 5, 1974 – The 555th Tactical Fighter Squadron moved without personnel or equipment from Udorn Royal Thai Air Force Base to Luke Air Force Base, Arizona, to become the first F-15 Eagle squadron in the Air Force.

July 6, 1951 – Maj. Henry H. “Hap” Arnold set a new speed record by flying 500 miles between Rockwell Field, California, and San Francisco in four hours, 25 minutes.
