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► THIS WEEK IN AIR FORCE HISTORY

May 1, 2001 - The Space Shuttle Endeavour landed at Edwards AFB after a mission to the International Space Station to deliver a robotic arm, a multipurpose logistics module, and an UHF antenna.

May 2, 1977 – 1st Lt. Christine E. Schott became the first woman undergraduate pilot student to solo in the T-38 Talon.

May 3, **1930** - Laura Ingalls completed 344 consecutive loops. Afterwards, she tried again and accomplished 980 loops. In another flight later in the year, she successfully completed 714 barrel rolls, giving her a pair of records no one has challenged.

May 4, 1979 - The A-10B flew its first flight at Edwards AFB, Calif.

May 5, 2004 - Two C-130s from the 146th AW (California ANG), equipped with the Modular Airborne Firefighting System, dropped 21,600 gallons of fire-retardant on the Cachuma fire in Santa Barbara County, Calif.

May 6, 1937 - The German dirigible Hindenberg burned while moored at Lakehurst, N.J. Thirty-five people died in the fire.

May 7, 1945 – At Reims, the German High Command surrendered unconditionally, effective May 9.
