Take Control of the Holidays

▶THIS WEEK IN AIR FORCE HISTORY

Dec. 4, 1942 - Ninth Air Force sent 24 B-24s to attack ships at the Naples docks in the first U.S. Army Air Forces air strike against mainland Italy in World War II.

Dec. 5, 1974 - Sikorsky Aircraft delivered the last HH-53 Super Jolly Green Giant helicopter to the Air Force.

Dec. 6, 2002 - The Air Force Flight Test Center at Edwards AFB had the X-45A unmanned combat air vehicle and a Global Hawk airborne on test missions at the same time. This marked the first time that two unmanned aircraft from two different programs were airborne simultaneously.

Dec. 7, 1941 - The Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor and brought America into World War II. Two waves of Japanese fighters sank four U.S. battleships and damaged nine others. Overall, the surprise attack killed 2,390 personnel, including 193 Airmen at Hickam, Wheeler, and Bellows Fields. They also destroyed 64 Hawaiian Air Force planes. Six Army Air Force pilots shot down 10 enemy planes with 2nd Lt. George S. Welch garnering four kills.

Dec. 8, 1976 - The full-scale development version of the F-16A Fighting Falcon made its maiden flight at Fort Worth, Texas

Dec. 9, 2006 - TSgt. Eric M. Olson, a loadmaster from the 313th Airlift Squadron, helped his aircrew safely land a C-17 hit by enemy fire while leaving Baghdad International Airport. Olson executed his emergency checklists, tended to a wounded passenger, and calmly readied the other passengers for an emergency landing. For his actions, he received the Distinguished Flying Cross Jan. 11, 2005.

Dec. 10, 1965 - Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara announced the development of the FB-111, a strategic and tactical F-111 bomber to replace the retiring B-58s and B-52s.

New personal property allotment rule implemented to protect Airmen

Enforcement action by the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau to eliminate a mechanism that predatory lenders use to take advantage of service members who finance purchases using the military pay allotment system has led to a policy of prohibiting paycheck allotments for consumer goods purchases.

Thrift Savings Plan limits increase for 2015

The Internal Revenue Service has increased both regular and catch-up limits for the coming tax year for Thrift Savings Plan contributions.

Master sergeant evaluation board, SNCO promotion changes coming in spring 2015

Focused on ensuring that job performance is the most important factor when evaluating and identifying Airmen for promotion, the phased implementation of the Enlisted Evaluation System and Weighted Airman Promotion System (WAPS) will be implemented over the next 16 months.

Officer attaché duty applications due Dec. 29

Applications for senior defense official/defense attaché, air attaché and assistant attaché will be accepted until Dec. 29.

Outstanding AF Civilian Employee of the Year nominations due

Outstanding achievement is the criteria for nominations due Jan. 8.
