► THIS WEEK IN AIR FORCE HISTORY

Sept. 26, 2000 - An F-15 team from Edwards AFB successfully used the Joint Helmet-Mounted Cueing System (JHMCS) to fire an AIM-9X *Sidewinder* air-to-air missile over the Navy's China Lake range. The missile destroyed an unmanned *Phantom II* drone.

Sept. 27, 1993 - Gen. James H. Doolittle, who led the first air raid on Tokyo and commanded the Eighth Air Force during World War II, dies at the age of 96.

Sept. 28, 1912 - Cpl. Frank S. Scott became the first enlisted fatality in Signal Corps Aviation.

Sept. 29, 1964 - The first of 36 Minuteman II launches occurred at Cape Kennedy, Fla. In this flight, the missile successfully delivered its payload nearly 5,000 miles downrange on target.

Sept. 30, 1949 - The Berlin airlift, gradually reduced since May 12, officially ended. Allied aircraft carried 2,343,301.5 tons of supplies on 277,264 flights. U.S. planes carried 1,783,826 tons.

Oct. 1, 1957 - USAF personnel launched their first intercontinental missile, the XSM-62 Snark in a flight from Cape Canaveral.

Oct. 2, 1981 - President Reagan reversed several of President Carter's defense decisions to support force modernization. He planned to construct and deploy 100 B-1B aircraft, continue the ALCM and M-X program, and develop an advanced stealth bomber. He also cancelled the horizontal multiple shelter basing scheme for the M-X in favor of basing in super-hard silos.
