75th Anniversary of the Civil Air Patrol

On Dec. 1, 1941, President Franklin D. Roosevelt established the Civil Air Patrol to facilitate civil defense during World War II. In Aug of 2015, Air Force Doctrine, Volume 2, "The Total Force" was updated to include the

CAP, the official Air Force Auxiliary, as a partner in the Total Force and included the

Air Force Auxiliary in its definition of the term "Airman." The all-volunteer CAP force has more than 58,000 members who support communities nationwide with emergency services, cadet programs, and aerospace education.

CAP Direct Support to the Air Force

- CAP Airmen fly nearly 100,000 hours per year performing the following missions:
 - **Disaster relief** Additionally, CAP provides ground transportation and an extensive communications network to support disaster relief.
 - Counterdrug efforts
 - CAP flies more than 85% of all federal inland search-and-rescue missions directed by the Air Force Rescue Coordination Center
 - Fighter intercept training
 - Acting as "surrogate RPAs," the CAP helps train new RPA pilots
 - Aerial observation to assist with base perimeter security
 - Light transport of cargo
 - CAP ensures the safety of low-altitude military-owned training routes
- CAP provides an estimated \$158M in volunteer labor each year to benefit the Air Force and the Nation. CAP crews are all volunteers they are not paid a salary or wage.
- CAP prides itself on being community based, and having resources close by can respond quickly to any scale emergency.

► THIS WEEK IN AIR FORCE HISTORY

Dec. 1, 2003 – Col. Linda K. McTeague assumed command of the 113th Wing (D.C. Air National Guard). She became the first woman to command an Air National Guard wing.

Dec. 2, 1993 - Through December 13th, Air Force Col. Richard O. Covey piloted the Space Shuttle Endeavour during a mission to repair the \$2 billion Hubble Space Telescope.

Dec. 3, 1988 – After a one-year trial program, the Air Force decided to continue its policy of assigning mixed male/female crews to 24-hour missile duty.

Dec. 4, 1942 – Ninth Air Force sent 24 B-24s to attack ships at the Naples docks in the first U.S. Army Air Forces air strike against mainland Italy in World War II.

Dec. 5, 1974 – Sikorsky Aircraft delivered the last HH-53 Super Jolly Green Giant helicopter to the Air Force.

Dec. 6, 2002 – The Air Force Flight Test Center at Edwards Air Force Base, California, had both the X-45A unmanned combat air vehicle and a Global Hawk airborne on test missions at the same time. This marked the first time that two unmanned aircraft from two different programs were airborne simultaneously.

Dec. 7, 1941 – The Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, and brought America into World War II. Two waves of Japanese fighters sank four U.S. battleships and damaged nine others. Overall, the surprise attack killed 2,390 personnel, including 193 Airmen at Hickam, Wheeler, and Bellows Fields, Hawaii. They also destroyed 64 Hawaiian Air Force planes. Six Army Air Force pilots shot down 10 enemy planes with 2nd Lt. George S. Welch garnering four kills.
