▶ THIS WEEK IN AIR FORCE HISTORY

April 7, 1999 -- The Air Force and the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency selected the Boeing Company to build two unmanned combat air vehicles for testing at the Dryden Flight Research Center at Edwards Air Force Base, California.

April 8, 1918 -- The 1st Aero Squadron, I Corps, was the first American squadron assigned to the front in World War I.

April 9, 1997 -- Lockheed Martin and the Boeing Company rolled out the F-22 Raptor at its Marietta, Georgia, plant.

April 10, 1974 -- C-130 Hercules aircraft, crews and communicators supported Operation Nimbus Star to sweep the Suez Canal free of mines and other obstacles to navigation.

April 11, 1918 -- The 1st Aero Squadron, I Corps Observation Group, equipped with bi-plane SPADS, made the first U.S. observation patrol over enemy lines in World War I.

April 12 1966 -- Strategic Air Command B-52 Stratofortresses hit targets in North Vietnam for the first time, when they attacked a supply route in the Mu Gia Pass, 85 miles north of the border.

April 13, 1925 -- Henry Ford started airplane freight operations between Detroit and Chicago. This was the first regularly scheduled commercial freight operation in the U.S.
