
Vice Chief of Staff Gen. David Goldfein

► THIS WEEK IN AIR FORCE HISTORY

March 24, 1992 – The last U.S. Air Force fighter aircraft to be stationed in Spain left the country after serving in there for 26 years.

March 25, 1986 – The first all-female Minuteman crew stood alert at the 351st Strategic Missile Wing, Whiteman Air Force Base, Missouri. This was the first time an all-female crew accomplished Minuteman combat crew duty under the gender-specific crew policy.

March 26, 1996 – The F-4 Phantom line retired from active service.

March 27, 1916 – Pilots with the 1st Aero Squadron aircraft started carrying mail and dispatches for the Mexican Punitive Expedition.

March 28, 1935 – Dr. Robert Goddard launched the first rocket with gyroscopic controls to a height of 4,800 feet and a distance of 13,000 feet. It reached a speed of 550 mph.

March 29, 1923 – At Dayton, Ohio, three Fédération Aéronautique Internationale records were established in a single day. First, Lt. A. Pearson flew a Verville Sperry R-3 at 167.77 mph a distance of more than 500 kilometers. Next, Lt. Harold R. Harris and Ralph Lockwood flew a DH-4L with a Liberty 400-horsepower engine at 127.42 mph for the 1,000-kilometer record. Third, Lt. Russell L. Maughan flew a Curtiss R-6 at 236.587 mph for a record over a straightaway course.

March 30, 1963 – Strategic Air Command accepted its first Titan II launch facility, which was at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Arizona.
